Curiosity – Passing the Hat

Struck in 1864 by a sudden and devastating illness that was never diagnosed, Commodore William D. Porter took to his bed in New York City. After being photographed three times by the famous Matthew Brady, the Union naval officer didn't have money enough to buy the portraits. Consequently, he sent word that he wanted members of three gunboats he had commanded (the Choctaw, Essex, and Lafayette) to pass the hat. If men of each vessel would deliver \$30 to him, he said, he'd be able to take possession of the Brady photos and die happy.

Editor's note: William David Porter was born in New Orleans in 1808 and grew up in Pennsylvania. He was the son of Commodore David Porter and the brother of Admiral David Dixon Porter. He was also a foster brother of Admiral David Farragut. He died in 1864 in New York City, reportedly of heart disease - never recovering from his 'undiagnosed' illness. I have seen no written reference that the men of the Choctaw, Essex, or Lafayette ever passed the hat as requested by the unfortunate Commodore!

Brothers, I am Bruce D. White of Buda, Texas. I am currently a Senior Broadcast IT Engineer at Spectrum News in Austin.

I am married to my high school sweetheart, the former Cheryl Lewis of Abilene, Texas. We have two grown children; our son Benjamin is a critical care physician in Atlanta and our daughter Bethany is marketing director in the pharmaceutical industry in Austin.

I served 20 years in the military. The first ten years was active duty in the U.S. Air Force. I was a crew chief on KC/EC-135 aircraft at Grissom AFB, Indiana in the 305th AREFW (Heavy), and am a First Gulf War Veteran. When Grissom AFB was closed, I became a heavy aircraft crew chief instructor at the technical school at Sheppard AFB in Wichita Falls, TX. After leaving active duty in 1996, I transferred to the Texas Army Guard as an AH-1 Cobra Crew Chief



in the 1/124th Air Cavalry, 49th Armored Division at Mueller Airfield in Austin. In 2000, after we lost our Cobra's, I was commissioned and became a data systems officer at Camp Mabry in Austin, until I completed my 20 years.

I am the founder of *Texas Search and Rescue* (TEXSAR), head-quartered in Austin, TX and was the Chief and CEO for the first eight years of operations. During this time, I was an Incident Commander for emergency responses to Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Ike, the last being in Chambers County, Texas. I am an active member of the *American Legion Riders, Knebel Post 83* in Austin. I am also a life member of the *Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 12161* in Buda, Texas.

I was led to the *SUVCW* by a round-about means. I have been actively working on genealogy for over ten years, and had run into a road block on my paternal ancestry. Recently, enough records became digitized and I got the breakthrough. I was able to find that my 3rd great-grandfather was a U.S. Cavalryman in the Civil War. After travelling to Washington DC, and researching the National Archives, I was able to locate the Widow's Pension file for my 3rd great-grandmother. He was a "Home-made Yankee", from Henderson County, Tennessee and served in the *13th West Tennessee Cavalry* (Bradford's Battalion). He was Private Addison H. White and was mortally wounded during the Fort Pillow Massacre on April 12, 1864.

I have three ancestors that were Confederate Cavalrymen and one who was a Union Cavalryman. I am very proud that my ancestor, Addison White, made the decision to be loyal to the United States. As a Southerner, living in the south, his decision speaks of his integrity and bravery. He paid the ultimate price for his service, being killed by fellow Tennesseans, fighting under General Forrest.

Curiosity - Leading the Charge

Fighting along the banks of the North Anna River in May 1864, men of Federal units were suddenly grateful, not for antics of pet animals, but for actions of farm creatures that belonged to Confederates. A sudden rush of "frightened cattle, hogs, sheep, and turkeys" brought the running animals directly in front of Union lines.

By the time soldiers recovered from astonishment as the animals charged directly over their trenches, they realized the meaning of their flight. Clearly, a massive Confederate force – of which they had no previous knowledge – was moving through the woods and driving the animals before them.


JROTC Presentations

Union Grave Marker Dedication

Tomball Heritage Festival

Saturday, May 18, 2019 - Tomball, Texas

The 4th Annual Tomball Heritage Festival was held once again at Spring Creek Park in Tomball. Brothers William Pollard, Michael Rappe, Ernest Kobs, and Michael Lance attended.

Michael Rappe participated with the Federal infantry during 2 hot skirmishes on the field. Brother Kobs donned a butternut uniform and participated with the Rebel infantry.

The Federal unit was relatively small and thus could only skirmish with the Confederates. The *Lea Camp* men combined with a larger number of seasoned soldiers of *Co. A, 13th Reg't U.S. Infantry*. The lone light federal cannon was greatly overmatched by the several heavy cannons which supported the Rebels. The light cannon was eventually surrendered near the conclusion of the first skirmish.

Corporal Lance was wounded near the end of the first skirmish. But fortunately, his battle injury was less severe than the result of his falling in the prickly burr-studded grass! Several more Union casualties littered the field before the fighting ended. Due to the very warm temperatures, all combatants were drenched through and through with sweat.

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Tomball Heritage Festival

To the rescue came Precinct 4, the hosts of the event. They had meat smokers on site and served a nice BBQ lunch and cool drinks between the skirmishes.

Fully refreshed, the small Federal company regrouped and fought with renewed vigor during the 2nd skirmish – and ultimately prevailed. The crowd of spectators were either appalled or delighted as the Rebels, while driven back and beaten, refused to surrender. They were shot down to the last man as they refused to lay down their arms. Several Federal soldiers refused to pull the trigger as the last remaining Rebel defiantly continued to load and fire. After that last man was dispatched, all was silent.

During the aftermath, our surviving unit of about 20 blue-clad soldiers were marched towards the spectators and were ordered to form up in line in front of them. Captain Whitesides then put the soldiers through several elements of the manual of arms to demonstrate the skill set of the Civil War soldier. He gave the crowd a nice educational narration about the action the guests had just witnessed on the battlefield, our weapons, and our uniforms. Many parents of youngsters on hand were delighted to take photos of their kids posing with the soldiers. It was a thoroughly enjoyable community event.

Memorial Day

Monday, May 27, 2019 – Houston, Texas

Volunteers had recently placed about 17,700 long-stemmed roses individually at the graves of veterans resting at the Houston National Cemetery. Thousands of other graves were adorned with small American flags.

The Memorial Day ceremonies were once again conducted inside the Hemicycle at the cemetery. The event was opened with the simultaneous blasting of two cannons positioned a few yards outside the entrance of the Hemicycle. One tube was manned by a crew from the *Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lea Camp #2, SUVCW*, and the other big gun was manned by the *Capt. Ike Turner Camp #1275, SCVCW*.

While introductory comments were made from the podium and the various branches of the military were recognized, a long line formed at the entrance of the Hemicyle. The line consisted of many different organizations – military veteran units, scouts, heritage groups, etc. Each group waited for their turn to march forward to salute and/or place a wreath in honor of the veterans.

A combined Color Guard consisting of members of the Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lea Camp 2 and Co. A, 13th Reg't U.S. Infantry

marched into their position in the line – and then eagerly waited for their turn to salute the veterans. After being announced, the Federal Color Guard marched forward into the center of the Hemicycle to the cadence of a drum. They then halted to render the salute – by presenting arms and dipping the Colors of the two units.

The Federals then waited outside the Hemicycle as the ceremonies continued. Arms were stacked and accoutrements and coats were removed – it was a warm day! Near the end of the program, the Federals formed an Honor Guard and

marched back into the Hemicycle. The unit was commanded by Cpt. Thomas Whitesides of the 13th U.S. Infantry. When in position, three well-coordinated 7-gun volleys were offered in salute to the veterans (see additional photo on page 28).

Meanwhile, the cannon crews of the *Edward Lea SUVCW* camp and the *Ike Turner SCVCW* camp, double-loaded and primed the two Napoleon's.

Following the musket salute, *Taps* was played. On the final note of *Taps*, both cannons were fired in perfect unison to end the program. As in previous years, the intensity of the cannon blasts set off numerous car alarms around the cemetery!

Origins of Memorial Day

In the years following the bitter Civil War, a former Union general took a holiday originated by former Confederates and helped spread it across the entire country. The holiday was Memorial Day, and this year's commemoration on May 27th marks the 151st anniversary of its official nationwide observance. The annual commemoration was born in the former Confederate States in 1866 and adopted by the United States in 1868. It is a holiday in which the nation honors its military dead.

Gen. John A. Logan, who headed the largest Union veterans' fraternity at that time, the *Grand Army of the Republic*, is usually credited as being the originator of the holiday. Yet when General Logan established the holiday, he acknowledged its genesis among the Union's former enemies, saying, "It was not too late for the Union men of the nation to follow the example of the people of the South."

Generous Acts Bore Fruit

During 1866, the first year of this annual observance in the South, a feature of the holiday emerged that made awareness, admiration, and eventually imitation of it spread quickly to the North. During the inaugural Memorial Day observances which were conceived in Columbus, Georgia, many Southern participants—especially women—decorated graves of Confederate soldiers as well as, unexpectedly, those of their former enemies who fought for the Union. Shortly after those first Memorial Day observances all across the South, newspaper coverage in the North was highly favorable to the ex-Confederates. "The action of the ladies on this occasion, in burying whatever animosities or ill-feeling may have been engendered in the late war towards those who fought against them, is worthy of all praise and commendation," wrote one paper.

On May 9, 1866, the *Cleveland Daily Leader* lauded the Southern women during their first Memorial Day. "The act was as beautiful as it was unselfish, and will be appreciated in the North."

The New York Commercial Advertiser, recognizing the magnanimous deeds of the women of Columbus, Georgia,

echoed the sentiment. "Let this incident, touching and beautiful as it is, impart to our Washington authorities a lesson in conciliation."

Power of a Poem

To be sure, this sentiment was not unanimous. There were many in both parts of the U.S. who had no interest in conciliation. But as a result of one of these news reports, Francis Miles Finch, a Northern judge, academic, and poet, wrote a poem titled "The Blue and the Gray." Finch's poem quickly became part of the American literary canon. He explained what inspired him to write it:

"It struck me that the South was holding out a friendly hand, and that it was our duty, not only as conquerors, but as men and their fellow citizens of the nation, to grasp it." Finch's poem seemed to extend a full pardon to the South: "They banish our anger forever when they laurel the graves of our dead" was one of the lines.

Almost immediately, the poem circulated across America in books, magazines, and newspapers. By the end of the 19th century, school children everywhere were required to memorize Finch's poem. The ubiquitous publication of Finch's rhyme meant that by the end of 1867, the southern Memorial Day holiday was a familiar phenomenon throughout the entire, and recently reunited, country. General Logan was aware of the forgiving sentiments of people like Finch. When Logan's order establishing Memorial Day was published in various newspapers in May 1868, Finch's poem was sometimes appended to the order.

'The Blue and the Grey'

It was not long before Northerners decided that they would not only adopt the Southern custom of Memorial Day, but also the Southern custom of "burying the hatchet." A group of Union veterans explained their intentions in a letter to the Philadelphia Evening Telegraph on May 28, 1869:

"Wishing to bury forever the harsh feelings engendered by the war, Post 19 has decided not to pass by the graves of the Confederates sleeping in our lines, but divide each year between the blue and the grey the first floral offerings of a common country. We have no powerless foes. Post 19 thinks of the Southern dead only as brave men."

Other reports of reciprocal magnanimity circulated in the North, including the gesture of a 10-year-old who made a



wreath of flowers and sent it to the overseer of the holiday, Colonel Leaming, in Lafayette, Indiana, with the following note attached, published in The New Hampshire Patriot on July 15, 1868: "Will you please put this wreath upon some rebel soldier's grave? My dear papa is buried at Andersonville, (Georgia) and perhaps some little girl will be kind enough to put a few flowers upon his grave."

President Abraham Lincoln's wish that there be "malice toward none" and "charity for all" was visible in the magnanimous actions of participants on both sides, who extended an olive branch during the Memorial Day observances in those first three years. Although not known by many today, the early evolution of the Memorial Day holiday was a manifestation of Lincoln's hope for reconciliation between North and South.


Melvín Lewis Myers





Civil War Trivia

Army Grayback – An ordinary body louse whose name was derived from its color. Frequently a source of annoyance to the soldiers in the field, this insect was minute but prolific. It was the bane of many a man held prisoner, whether in the South or in the North. Even during weeks or months in the open, soldiers became infested with the pests. Not only do lice cause discomfort but they also can be vectors of deadly diseases, such as typhus.

"We went into summer quarters at Tupelo. Our principal occupation at this place was playing poker, chucka-lucka and cracking graybacks (lice). Every soldier had a brigade of lice on him, and I have seen fellows so busily engaged in cracking them that it reminded me of an old woman knitting...Civil War memoir of Sam R. Watkins, Confederate soldier

Johnny Shiloh, the Smallest Drummer

In May of 1861, nine year old John Lincoln "Johnny" Clem ran away from his home in Newark, Ohio, to join the Union

Army. But he found the Army was not interested in signing on a 9 year old boy. The commander of the 3rd Ohio Regiment told him he "wasn't enlisting infants," and turned him down. Clem tried the 22nd Michigan Regiment next, and its commander told him the same. Determined, Clem tagged after the regiment, acted out the role of a drummer boy, and was allowed to remain. Though still not regularly enrolled, he performed camp duties and received a soldier's pay of \$13 a month, a sum collected and donated by the regiment's officers.

The next April, at Shiloh, Clem's drum was smashed by an artillery round and he became a minor news item as "Johnny Shiloh, The Smallest Drummer". A year later, at the Battle of Chickamauga, he rode an artillery caisson to the front and wielded a musket trimmed to his size. In one of the Union retreats a Confederate officer ran after the cannon Clem rode with, and yelled, "Surrender you damned little Yankee!" Johnny shot him dead. This pluck won for Clem national attention and the name "Drummer Boy of Chickamauga."

Clem stayed with the Army through the war, served as a courier, and was wounded twice. Between Shiloh and Chickamauga he was regularly enrolled in the service, began receiving his own pay, and was soon-after promoted to the rank of Sergeant. He was only 12 years old.

After the Civil War, he tried to enter West Point but was turned down because of his slim education. A personal appeal to President Ulysses S. Grant, his commanding general at Shiloh, won him a 2nd Lieutenant's appointment in the Regular Army on December 18, 1871, and in 1903 he attained the rank of Colonel and served as Assistant Quartermaster General. He retired from the Army as a Major General in 1916, having served an astounding 55 years.

General Clem died in San Antonio, Texas on May 13, 1937, exactly 3 months shy of his 86th birthday, and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.Source: American Conservative Veterans Facebook page

Civil War Medal of Honor Recipients – U.S. Navy (part 14)

The Medal of Honor is the USA's highest military honor, awarded for personal acts of valor above and beyond the call of duty. It was first awarded during the Civil War after President Lincoln signed a bill containing a provision for the medal for the Navy on December 21, 1861. It was "to be bestowed upon such petty officers, seamen, landsmen, and Marines as shall most distinguish themselves by their gallantry and other seamanlike qualities during the present war."




Left: Navy Version of the original Medal of Honor (1862)

With this issue of the Harriet Lane, in honor of Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lea USN - the namesake of our Camp, I am continuing to present a review of the recipients of the Medal of Honor who served in the U.S. Navy during the Civil War....editor

William Joseph Franks – Seaman. William Franks was born in Pittsboro, North Carolina in 1830. He enlisted in the Navy on September 16, 1863. Franks distinguished himself in action at Yazoo City, Mississippi on March 5, 1864 when he and his shipmates from the USS Marmora landed a 12-pound howitzer to defend the city, which was threatened by strong Confederate forces. He and his group were in the thickest of the fighting, but it was never enough to drive them from their cannon. The actions of Franks and his men came to play the most important role in maintaining the Union position. Franks received the Medal of Honor and was promoted to Acting Master's Mate

in recognition of his actions. Two of his shipmates, Seaman James Stoddard and Seaman Bartlett Laffey, were also awarded the medal for being on the gun crew. Franks was discharged from the Navy in August 1865, and settled in Arkansas. He married Mary Francis in 1865, after his separation from the Navy; according to the 1880 Federal census, they had 5 children. William J. Franks died in April 1880 and is buried in Maple Springs Cemetery in Batesville, Arkansas. His citation reads:



USS Marmora

Served on board the U.S.S. Marmora off Yazoo City, Miss., 5 March 1864. Embarking from the Marmora with a 12-pound howitzer mounted on a field carriage, Franks landed with the gun and crew in the midst of heated battle and, bravely standing by his qun despite enemy rifle fire which cut the qun carriage and rammer contributed to the turning back of the enemy during the fierce engagement.

Martin Freeman – Civilian pilot. Martin Freeman was a civilian employee of the Union Navy during the Civil War. He is one of only a handful of civilians to have received the Medal of Honor. Freeman was born May 18, 1814, in Germany. He was living in Louisiana when he was hired by the Navy as a pilot. He served aboard Admiral David Farragut's flagship, the USS Hartford. Throughout the Battle of Mobile Bay, Alabama, on August 5, 1864, Freeman guided the Union fleet into the bay from Hartford's maintop despite heavy Confederate fire. He was promoted to acting volunteer lieutenant in October 1864, and was honorably discharged in January 1867. He died in 1894 at age 80 and was buried at Greenwood Cemetery in Pascagoula, Mississippi. His Medal of Honor citation reads:

As pilot of the flagship, U.S.S. Hartford, during action against Fort Morgan, rebel gunboats and the ram Tennessee, in Mobile Bay, 5 August 1864. With his ship under terrific enemy shellfire, Freeman calmly remained at his station in the maintop and skillfully piloted the ships into the bay. He rendered gallant service throughout the prolonged battle in which the rebel gunboats were captured or driven off, the prize ram Tennessee forced to surrender, and the fort successfully attacked.

Civil War Medal of Honor Recipients – U.S. Navy (part 14 continued)

> John B. Frisbee – Gunner's Mate. John Frisbee was born Jan. 7, 1825 in Phippsburg, Maine. In August 1861, he joined the Navy from Brookline, Massachusetts. He served as a gunner's mate on the *USS Pinola*. At the Battle of Forts Jackson and St. Philip near New Orleans on Apr. 24, 1862, *Pinola's* berth deck was struck by shellfire and set aflame. Frisbee prevented the fire from spreading to the ship's stored gunpowder by shutting himself into the magazine. He was discharged in Oct. 1863 and died Sep. 9, 1903 at age 78. Frisbee was buried in Winnegance, Maine. His citation reads:

Served on board the U.S. Steam Gunboat Pinola during action against Forts Jackson and St. Philip, and during the taking of New Orleans, 24 April 1862. While engaged in the bombardment of Fort St. Philip, Frisbee, acting courageously and without personal regard, closed the powder magazine which had been set afire by enemy shelling and shut off his avenue of escape, thereby setting a high example of bravery. He served courageously throughout these engagements which resulted in the taking of the Forts Jackson and St. Philip and in the surrender of New Orleans.

➤ William Gardner – Seaman. William Gardner was born in 1832 in Ireland. He immigrated to the U.S. and was living in New York when he joined the U.S. Navy. He served during the Civil War as a seaman on the USS Galena. At the Battle of Mobile Bay on August 5, 1864, he "behaved with conspicuous coolness" despite heavy fire. For this action, he was awarded the Medal of Honor 4 months later. He later obtained the rank of ship's cook. His citation reads:

As seaman on board the U.S.S. Galena in the engagement at Mobile Bay, 5 August 1864. Serving gallantly during this fierce battle which resulted in the capture of the rebel ram Tennessee and the damaging of Fort Morgan. Gardner behaved with conspicuous coolness under the fire of the enemy.

▶ James R. Garrison – Coal Heaver. James Garrison was born June 22, 1838, in Poughkeepsie, New York. He was still living in that state when he joined the U.S. Navy. He served during the Civil War as a coal heaver on Admiral David Farragut's flagship, the USS Hartford. At the Battle of Mobile Bay on August 5, 1864, he lost a toe to Confederate fire but continued his duties at the shell whip (a device used to lift ammunition up to the gun deck) until receiving a 2nd severe wound. Garrison died on April 19, 1908, at age 69 and was buried at Hampton National Cemetery in Hampton, Virginia. His Medal of Honor citation reads:

On board the flagship, U.S.S. Hartford, during successful engagements against Fort Morgan, rebel gunboats and the ram Tennessee in Mobile Bay, on 5 August 1864. When a shell struck his foot and severed one of his toes, Garrison remained at his station at the shell whip and, after crudely bandaging the wound, continued to perform his duties until severely wounded by another shellburst.

William Garvin – Captain of the Forecastle. Garvin was born in 1835. He was from Canada and entered service in Plymouth, Connecticut. Garvin was one of 30 Canadians to receive the Medal of Honor. His award was for bravery during combat at the First Battle of Fort Fisher onboard the U.S.S. Agawam. He was posthumously honored with the award on December 31, 1864. His citation reads:

The President of the United States of America, in the name of Congress, takes pleasure in presenting the Medal of Honor to Captain of the Forecastle William Garvin, United States Navy, for extraordinary heroism in action while serving on board the U.S.S. Agawam, as one of a volunteer crew of a powder boat which was exploded near Fort Fisher, North Carolina, 23 December 1864. The powder boat, towed in by the Wilderness to prevent detection by the enemy, cast off and slowly steamed to within 300 yards of the beach. After fuses and fires had been lit and a second anchor with short scope let go to assure the boat's tailing inshore, the crew again boarded the Wilderness and proceeded a distance of 12 miles from shore. Less than two hours later the explosion took place, and the following day fires were observed still burning at the fort.to be continued next issue

Musket Salute at the Houston National Cemetery

This musket salute volley was followed by the sounding of *Taps*. As the final note of *Taps* faded away, two 1841 six-pound Napoleon cannons were fired simultaneously in perfect unison.

One of the cannons was fired by a crew from the *Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lea Camp, SUVCW*, and the other was fired by the *Capt. Ike Turner Camp, SCVCW*.
