GENERAL ORDERS No. 3.

VI. RAILROAD FARE: The railroads have authorized reduced rates from many points in Texas, to San Antonio, for San Jacinto celebration and Battle of Flowers, that will be open to the public. Those attending the Encampment, are advised to consult local railway agents as to the rate that will be in effect.

VII. The local committees of Grand Army Post, auxiliary and allied organizations, will arrange for meeting places for the Encampment and Conventions.

The Thirty-Ninth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Texas, and the Thirty-Fifth Annual Convention of the Women's Relief Corps Auxiliary to the G. A. R., held in San Antonio, April 22-23, will go down in history as one of the most enthusiastic, profitable and pleasant in the history of the Orders.

The opening session of the Encampment was a joint affair, Charles Sickels, Commander of E. O. C. Ord Post No. 3, G. A. R., presiding; Alva J. Brasted, chaplain 2nd Division, United States Army, pronounced the invocation; Frank H. Bushick, representing Mayor John Tobin, welcomed the visitors—Mayor John Tobin arrived later and extended personal greetings.

Mrs. Maude Green of Houston, representing the Women's Relief Corps, Department of Texas, presented to the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Texas, a large silk U. S. flag, the presentation speech was an original poem, as follows:

Ketchum to express thanks to the committee. The response was given in expressions of patriotic gratitude.

Senior Vice-Commander Wagner made a verbal report, saying he had not prepared a written one for the reason that he had not been called to perform any official duties.

Comrade Ed N. Ketchum moved to adjourn to meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, at which time the first business would be the nomination and election of officers for the ensuing year. Carried.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 23, 1924-10 A. M.

Commander Blake called the Encampment to order and Department Chaplain Anson Miller invoked the Divine blessings. Commander Blake announced the Encampment opened for business.

In accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, the following hereinafter named Comrades were duly nominated and elected officers and representatives for the ensuing year: J. Heil, San Antonio, Patriotic Instructor. Representative at Large; John H. Rosa, Marble Falls; Representative: Dexter Wagner, Denison; Alternates: A. W. Small and A. W. Robins, San Antonio. Council of Administration: F. J. Yingling, Dallas; T. H. Sellers, Houston; J. M. Kinderdine, Fort Worth; J. H. Dunn, Denison; T. U. Johnson, Paris.

Committee from the W. R. C., consisting of Mary J. Casey, Lola Villaneuva and Georgia Warren were admitted. They were escorted to the platform and Mary J. Casey announced they came with loyal greeting for mthe auxiliary organization to the Grand Army of the Republic. Each made patriotic talks which were highly appreciated, and complimented by a rising vote of the Encampment.

Motion made Comrade Anson Miller that the salary of the Asst. A. G. and Q. M. G. be reduced to \$25 per annum, being duly seconded, carried.

Commander called for invitations for holding our next Encampment. Fort Worth member announced that they could not take the Encampment for 1925, but would be prepared to take the next Encampment. Comrade R. McCormick of Richard J. Oglesby Post No. 6, Dallas, Texas, gave an invitation for holding the next Encampment in Dallas. On motion seconded by several Comrades, the invitation was accepted. It was agreed that the date for holding the Encampment be left to the local post and W. R. C., with the approval of the Council of Administration.
